Richard Dawkins first created the idea of a meme in his 1976 guide "The Selfish Gene". Essentially, memes are some ideas that evolve based on the same maxims that govern natural evolution. Many of them may came from buddies and some can came from the web or television. Types of memes are musical tunes, cracks, traits, fashions, get phrases, and car designs. Now, the memes that inhabit the mind come in competition with all the other memes in the memepool (the number of all present memes). What this means is they are all competing to get themselves replicated into different people's minds. Several of those memes do rather well. Everytime you whistle your chosen tune or complete a helpful catch phrase, you're facilitating the spread of the memes.
