

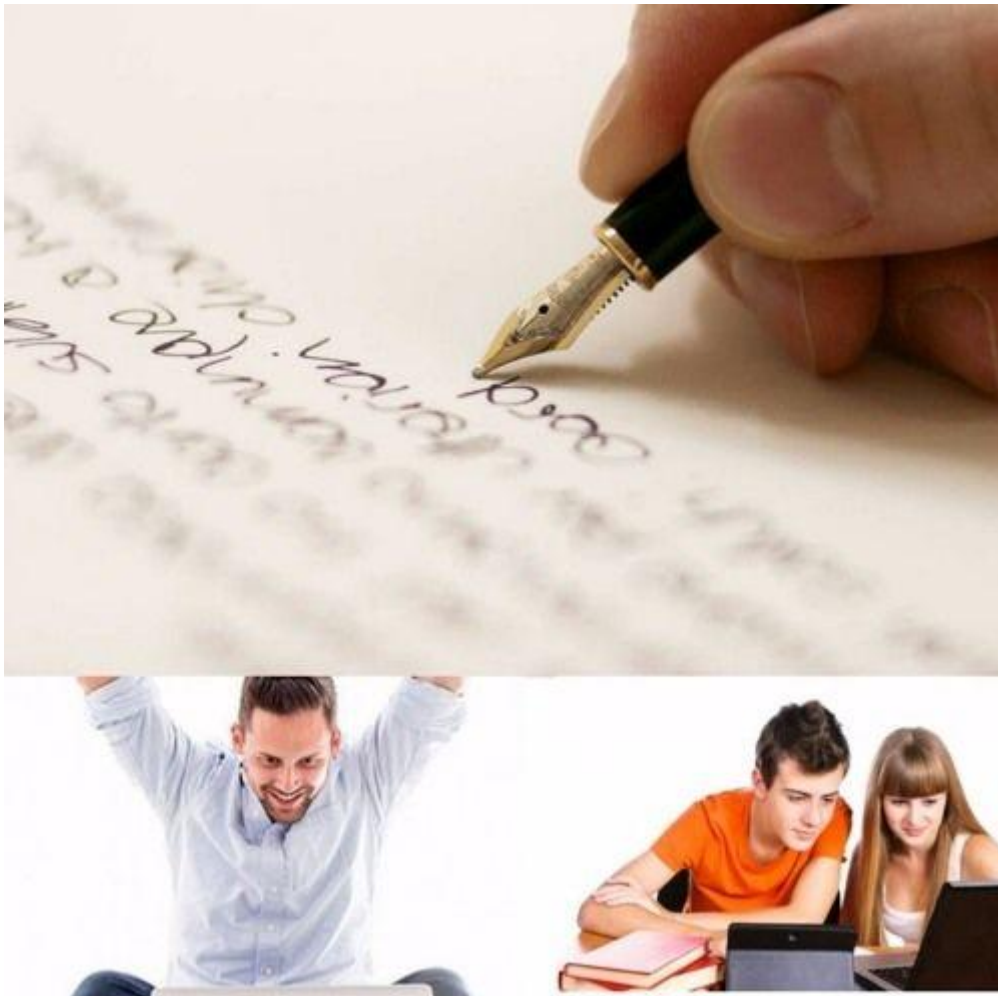


Major Suggestions in Writing a Dissertation
