A suitable data center must have a backup power supply. Examine the data center's redundant systems in the event of an emergency or adverse weather. You'll also want to make sure their infrastructure has adequate ventilation and cooling.

Within one year, 93 percent of enterprises that spent ten days or more due to a failure filed for bankruptcy. To avoid becoming a bankruptcy statistic, look for a reliability percentage of over 99 percent.

3. Safety and security

A good security system is essential for a data center. Because it holds all of your company's data and apps, a breach might spell disaster. Moreover, a cyber attack on a data center costs around \$4 million on average.

Data centers should have strong physical security as well as software and technology to protect your assets. Depending on its size, your facility should have proper locks, surveillance, and sometimes even security guards.

4. Scalability and adaptability
