

What Cabinet Colours Go with Dark Floor?

White with High Contrast



Colour schemes with a lot of contrast are always popular. As a matter of fact, the black-and-white kitchen has been a popular choice for over a century. Many designers today use dark browns, blues, and greens in combination with white to play on that theme. The contrast isn't quite as stark, but the effects of this high-impact design are still apparent. Dark wood floors and bright white cabinets work well together. They're especially useful in low-light situations.

Warmth in Off-White



Off-white is also a good choice. They usually have yellow or brown hints that add warmth to the white. That warmth picks up on the same features in the wood. The overall effect softens and cozyizes the entire space. Off-white is the way to go if your design has a rustic undertone. It's warm and inviting, just as you'd expect from a modern farmhouse design.

Grey Cool



Gray cabinets against a dark wood floor have the same effect as off-white cabinets but have the opposite effect. It gives the room a more relaxed vibe. Gray and dark wood provide enough contrast to create a stand-out design in modern and contemporary design styles.



Intensity Matching

Cabinets that match your dark wood floors will help to continue the rich, bold theme of your kitchen floor. The use of dark wood throughout the kitchen creates a confident design with a stunning output. These two major players in your kitchen design will take up the majority of your space, so it's important to break up the drama with lighter components, as well as different textures and finishes.




Dark Wall Colours:


Larders for a Dark Kitchen

Explore Metal Effects

Concave handles add a unique touch to the doors, which are made of stainless steel that has been blasted to dull the shine and darken the appearance. I enjoy combining fine craftsmanship with unique and beautiful materials and textures.

Choose a Dramatic Yet Classic Look



It appears almost black but has a magical depth. I knew we needed to make the kitchen feel cosy because it is to the side of a large, light room. Dark surfaces, rather than classic white, were used to make the kitchen feel more like its own space.



Colour it Black



The use of two deep shades of paint adds to the richness of this scheme.

A thick band of brass in the Shadowline of the kitchen countertop elevates the glamorous quartzite to a new level on the kitchen island.

Finally, a trio of dark glass pendants and plush emerald bar stools were added to the space, adding poise, texture, and a swish of deep-jewel colour.

Choose a Darkly Stained Wood

To avoid losing the natural beauty of the wood, taking it in a contemporary direction requires careful thought.


This wood kitchen cabinet concept strikes a balance between traditional and modern. It is clearly a real solid wood door, but the colour abstracts it and adds a modern touch.

Kitchen Cabinets in Dark Colour Schemes with a Dark Worktop

Highlight with White



If you're going double-dark in your kitchen, it's a good idea to include a few light colours as well, to ensure adequate lighting for cooking and to really bring to light the darker elements.



A Feature on the Island



If you're afraid of using too many dark surfaces in your kitchen, start with just one. The homeowners, for example, chose a thin black worktop for the island and a lighter wooden surface along the wall.

Combine Materials

Combine different types of dark worktop material for added interest. In this space, the designers installed a mottled ceramic surface and complemented it with a section of black walnut along one edge of the island to zone the breakfast area.

Add Some Glitz



Combine deep-toned worktops with dark metallic units for a truly dramatic look. The gleaming, patinated metal in this kitchen adds luxurious interest. An extra-thick work surface adds even more personality, but the dark tones keep the overall look elegant.

White **Marble** Softens the Look

Dark tones can give a room a chic, understated look, but if you're worried that they'll be too harsh, there are ways to soften them.

Make it Consistent

Choose an element that ties your cabinets and worktops together to create a balance.
