- Soft nylon or grout brushes or an old toothbrush
- A spray bottle
- A pH-neutral tile cleaner (or mild dish soap)
- Baking soda
- Hydrogen peroxide
- Clean water for rinsing
- Grout sealer (for after cleaning)

You can try using a paste of baking soda and hydrogen peroxide for stubborn grout stains, letting it sit 10-30 minutes, then scrubbing. This method is less aggressive than bleach, but still effective. Also, avoid using straight bleach or harsh acids repeatedly. Bleach can degrade grout over time, making the problem worse.

Step-by-Step Bathroom Cleaning Process

1. Pre-Clean and Prep

- Ventilate the bathroom (open windows, run fan).
- Remove loose debris or dust from tiles with a dry brush or vacuum.
- Protect fixtures (faucets, metal finishes) with a damp cloth. You don't want any cleaner sitting on chrome, brass, or plated surfaces.

2. Clean Tiles (Walls and Floors)

- Mix a gentle cleaner: one part distilled white vinegar and two parts warm water.
- Spray lightly on tiles and let it sit for a minute or two to loosen soap scum.

- For tougher spots, dip in baking soda and scrub gently (especially on floors).
- Rinse thoroughly with clean water.

3. Attack Grout Lines

- Apply a paste of baking soda and hydrogen peroxide to the grout lines.

- For extra stubborn stains, some people cover the paste with cling wrap for 10-15 minutes to keep it moist.
- Then scrub with a narrow brush or toothbrush.
- Rinse the area well, then mop or wipe away residue.

4. Clean the Fixtures (Faucets, Shower Heads, Toilet Surrounds)

For faucets and handles: wrap a soft cloth soaked in vinegar and water around them for 15-30 minutes, then wipe clean. This helps dissolve limescale. After removing the wrap, wipe with a dry microfiber cloth.

Post-Cleaning

Seal the grout once dry. A good sealer fills micro-pores and keeps stains from penetrating again. Many homeowners report that sealed grout “wipes clean” more easily, while unsealed grout becomes a constant battle.

- **Regular Maintenance:** After each shower, squeegee tiles or wipe them down to prevent soap film from building up.
- **Spot Clean Regularly:** Every week, try spot cleaning so you don't let grime oxidize into permanent stains.
