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Austria and Germany share a long history and cultural similarities. Culturally, the legacy of classical composers like Mozart, Beethoven and Strauss lives on strongly in both nations . Traditional architecture with Gothic spires and Baroque designs decorate Old Town quarters. Cuisine shares dishes such as wiener schnitzel, sausages and pastries. A passion for soccer unites citizens and the alpine landscapes inspire art and recreation. Germany took the lead industrially yet Austria dominates in skiing at the Winter Olympics. German influence also led Austria to adopt the euro currency in 2002 while Germany remains the EU's largest economy.

Overall, the tight bond between Austria and Germany emerges from their shared Saxon heritage. Both make invaluable contributions to European stability and progress. While retaining their distinct personalities, Austrians and Germans celebrate their long relationship and look forward to further cooperation 欄 on the international stage.
