So far, enhanced horse improvement programs have been responsible for regular allocation to support the site, managed by the Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs, and now it is time for regular change and generous allocation, Fedeli says the main purpose of the move is to prioritize taxpayers.

Because this is one of Ontario's characteristics, individuals involved in the field of horse breeding in rural communities will now be able to rely on support. In the long run, it is expected to maintain existing jobs in the field and create new ones. It should also be taken into account that the optional slot program at the racetrack will also continue to operate, while supporting race courses to people like Hiawata and Kawarta Downs.

As part of that, OSARP will provide regular financial support to race courses that can be funded to ensure operations continue. Individuals directly affected by racetracks and their offerings will continue to rely on sustainability. In addition, the Ontario Lottery and Game Company is determined to revitalize the sector with the help of a program that guarantees C\$105 million per year over a 19-year period.

The funds will be used to support race courses and wallets. April 1st is considered a special day because it is the day when the first part of the funds is provided. OLG Chairman and Chief Executive Officer Stephen Rigby has officially announced that a bright day is approaching and

With Gateway Casis & Entertainment announcing a change in plans, the future of London's Western Fair District looks brighter. He pointed out that there is not much that can be done until the lease of the Gateway Casino is over. If this happens in the next year, when this lease ends, we will have to start a conversation in government with Ontario Lottery and gaming companies to ensure a sustainable future for London horse racing.
