Regulatory Rules Impacting Wagering Caps

In the UK, the Gambling Commission has taken clear steps to regulate wagering requirements and caps to protect players from unfair bonus terms. From 19 January, wagering requirements cannot exceed 10 times the total of your deposit plus bonus amount. This sets an effective ceiling on how tough bonuses can be.

Although the UKGC doesn't specify exact bet-size caps, many operators implement low bet limits—often around £5 per spin—to meet the spirit of this rule. Casinos must also clearly disclose these terms on their bonus pages, ensuring players know what to expect upfront.
