## 2. Incorporate Bottle Storage

### 3. Add Built-in Storage

## 7. Create Consistency

## 9. Style a Coffee Nook

Since the coffee machine (and all the gadgets that come with it) take up precious counter space, turn an under-utilized area into the ultimate caffeine station. Hide machines and cords under a skirt, then keep all your coffee and tea essentials on built-in shelves.



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## 10. Get Bold with Backsplash

Use tile to trick the eye: Place it vertically to create the illusion of height or horizontally to make a room appear wider. Colour also comes into play, which is why designer Maureen Stevens opted for a geometric tile that played up the kitchen's white cabinets and walls.



## 11. Add Task Lighting

Light up a specific area - your prep station, perhaps? — With stylish sconces. Find one in the same finish as the rest of the kitchen hardware for stability.

## 12. Stick with One Colour
